## RESOLUTION \#157

## IN SUPPORT OF EQUITABLE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL PLANNING PROCESS IN LONG ISLAND CITY

WHEREAS P.S. 384, which opened in 2018 in a temporary space and is now located in Q375 at 1-35 57 Avenue, is unzoned, and does not have an intentional enrollment plan, and

WHEREAS the population of Long Island City has grown at an extraordinary pace, and will continue to grow, as new residential buildings are under construction and planned throughout the area, ${ }^{1}$ and

WHEREAS Long Island City has the most segregated schools by race and economic need of any area in District 30: the demographics of several schools in Long Island City differ dramatically from one another and from those of the district as a whole, ${ }^{2}$ and

WHEREAS the Department of Education has prioritized school integration, striving to bring the demographics of individual schools in line with those of their district, ${ }^{3}$ and

[^0]WHEREAS parents, students, and other community members have not historically had active roles in school zoning or planning processes, and low-income communities, communities of color, and residents of public housing have been especially denied this participation, and

WHEREAS while the Department of Education's Office of District Planning made sincere efforts in the spring of 2021 to engage affected communities, it does not have available staff who are experienced in community engagement with diverse communities such as those in Long Island City, and

WHEREAS, in the Fall of 2021, the Office of District Planning secured financing and advertised to hire an independent contractor to facilitate a planning process for Long Island City, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that District 30 Community Education Council supports the engagement by the Office of District Planning of a contractor experienced in fostering equitable participation among diverse populations to organize and execute a robust school planning process for elementary school students in Long Island City.
