• FaceLab - My Bothers Keeper at Q111

The Program began on March 14, 2019 at PS/IS 111Q. The 5th and 6th grade classes are scheduled for partnership. The partnership is being exemplified through Robotics; Systems, Thinking, Interconnections and Functions. The school received Lego Robotics kits for each child.

There are 10 Lessons taught weekly; co-led by the on site consultants and the 5th grade teachers including the technology teacher. The lessons are designed to build sophisticated gear systems in a robot and to program the robot. The finale is to create a robot with a systems of gears to play "Battlebots". Battlebots is a game designed for the students to use their robots to compete with other scholars' robots.

FaceLab is a multi-3 year program with culmination competitions with other schools. The Parent Component is supported by the school's Parent Coordinator. The parents attend three (3) training sessions with the first on March 12th. The parent coordinator also attended. The parents also support in the classroom and help organize the FaceLab materials.

<u>Opportunity to Recommend Cultural Institutions</u>: As in past years, SITC programs will continue to offer an opportunity for mandated summer school students as well as non-mandated students who are participating in SITC Summer Academy, to visit cultural institutions in the city.

Extended Deadline to Ensure Schools Complete the NYC School Survey

The deadline to complete the 2018–19 NYC School Survey for parents/guardians, students, support staff and teachers was extended to **April 11** (from April 3). Schools should finalize survey administration and return all completed surveys by this new date.

Review Bullying Complaint Procedures and Definition

In accordance with Chancellor's Regulation A-832, all staff are required to report student-on-student discrimination, harassment, intimidation and/or bullying; all reports must be investigated and appropriate follow-up action taken.

Kindergarten Offers and Waitlists

Kindergarten offers will be emailed to families in the next few days. Hard copies will be mailed to families via USPS next week. Families who accept their kindergarten offers must pre-register by **May 3.** If schools have seats available and there are zoned students on waitlist—whether they applied late or moved to an address zoned for a particular school after the application period—school officials should make offers to these students and track the offers on the waitlist. As a reminder, any family who wants to be placed on the waitlist should be added to the waitlist, regardless of priority level.

Administer the New York State (NYS) Grades 3–8 ELA and Math Exams

The New York State (NYS) grades 3–8 ELA and math exams will be administered from **April 2–3** and **May 1–2**, respectively.

Prepare for Civics Week and Student Voter Registration Drive

As noted in the February 26 edition of *Principals' Weekly*, Civics Week activities, including the 2019 Student Voter Registration Drive and Civics For All Poster Contest, will occur from April 8–12.

Encourage Attendance at 2019 Candidate Forums for CCEC Elections

District Presidents' Councils are holding Community and Citywide Education Council (CCEC) election candidate forums from March 25–**May 1**. Candidate forums allow CCEC candidates to meet parents and parent selectors who will vote for candidates for their district's CCEC; voting will take place from **May 2**–**14**. Note that parent selectors are the PA/PTA presidents, recording secretaries, and treasurers from each school. Please ensure that parent coordinators encourage parent selectors and candidates in their district to attend the forum.

Community School District 30 held their Forum on April 2, 2019. Twenty-four candidates and thirteen schools attended the forum.

Encourage Participation of Rising High School Seniors in Citywide and Community Education Councils (CCECs)

School officials and the school community can support students in joining the Education Council in the following ways:

- Citywide Council High Schools (CCHS): In accordance with NYS Education Law 2590-b and Chancellor's Regulation D-160, school officials or a designee should encourage students, who will be seniors during the 2019–20 school year and who are members of their school's student government, to apply for a seat on the Citywide Council High Schools (CCHS).
- Community Education Council (CEC): As per Chancellor's Regulation D-140, school officials or a designee should encourage rising seniors, who are members of the school's student government and who reside in the district, to apply for a seat at your corresponding Community Education Council (CEC). by June 1.
- Citywide Council on English Language Learners (CCELL), Citywide Council on Special Education (CCSE), and Citywide Council for District 75 (CCD75): As per Chancellor's Regulation D-150 and D-170, school officials or a designee should identify rising seniors, who are members of their school's student government and who are also English Language Learners, have an IEP, or receive services in District 75, and encourage these students to apply for the Citywide Council on English Language Learners (CCELL), the Citywide Council on Special Education (CCSE), and for the Citywide Council for District 75 (CCD75).

College Access for All—High School: Update on New CUNYfirst College Application System

The City University of New York (CUNY) has a new college application platform called CUNYfirst. CUNY has reported technical issues with CUNYfirst, which may result in incomplete college applications for students. School officials and their college and career point-person should have received an email from counselor@cuny.edu with a CUNY college application status report. School officials were asked to review the data carefully with their college and career point-person to resolve any incomplete college as outlined in the CUNY report.
