Superintendent's Report Community District Education Council CDEC30 Meeting May 13, 2019

In support of the Framework for Great Schools under Supportive Environment

Implicit Bias Training – June 11, 2019

On June 11, 2019, District 30 staff, including teachers, administrators, paraprofessionals, parent coordinators, secretaries, school aides and related service providers had the opportunity to hear Dr. Bryant T. Marks speak on Implicit Bias. Dr. Marks is Founding Director and Principal Trainer for The National Training Institute on Race & Equity and a Psychology Professor at Morehouse College. It was truly an exceptional presentation and all walked away with a better understanding of what implicit bias is and how the potential impact of implicit bias on work-related decisions, behavior, and outcomes can be reduced.

District 30 2019-2020 GOALS

• NYSIP- PLC Grant (Phase II) - Integration Grant - Budget \$130,000 2019-20

The grant has four components: (1) new outreach protocols for the district's Pre-K to grade 12 Dual Language programs; (2) partnerships: with CSD 24 and 25 (neighboring districts) to promote existing and new Magnet School programs, STEM partnership activities and shared zoning patterns which support inter-district diversity and integration; (3) new outreach strategies for the Middle School Choice program; (4) professional and curriculum development for CSD 30 teachers and administrators on Culturally Responsive Education and Implicit Bias prevention with Dr. Bryant Marks. This new CSD 30 strategic diversity plan will build upon previous and existing efforts to improve integration and educational equity within its K-12 schools and promote increased minority representation and balance in the various programs outlined in the four components listed above.

- (1) New outreach strategies for the district's Pre-K to grade 12 Dual Language programs. These communication strategies will reach out to families in schools who are currently underrepresented in these programs and increase their enrollment.
- (2) <u>Partnerships:</u> CSD 30 in collaboration with CSD 24/25, Queens College/CUNY and the NY Hall of Science will establish collaborative special Magnet and STEM academic programs in five pilot programs. These rigorous academic science/math project based learning activities will link underrepresented students to students in higher performing schools during and after the school day through joint projects. PS 92's and IS 145's magnet school programs will also expand their outreach and support STEM project based learning.
- (3) <u>Student Support</u>: New outreach strategies for the Middle School Choice program and the screened High School Programs including free prep courses for schools with underrepresented minorities in order to help them more successfully gain admission.
- (4) <u>Professional and curriculum development</u> for CSD 30 school staff and administrators on Culturally Responsive Education and Implicit Bias prevention in collaboration with the National Training Institute on Race and Equity. CSD 30 will also employ the Queens North Borough Office for additional learning opportunities in culturally relevant pedagogy. All schools in the district will be better prepared to support diversity and reduce cultural bias in their classroom based educational programs as a result of participating in training.

The CSD 30 strategic integration plan addresses all four of the strategies listed above to further promote voluntary change in school enrollments in order to impact the insufficient diversity in certain schools as reflected in district averages for specific subgroups. This will be done through the four components outlined above. The strategy is designed to reach out and support underrepresented subgroups to voluntarily participate in special programs such as the Dual Language Program; Magnet Schools program; Middle School Choice; STEM Science/Math initiative; screened high school tutoring and targeted recruitment from participating CSD 24/25 schools.

Manage Transportation Information and Eligibility Changes - Updates

Communicate to Families Affected by Changes in Busing Eligibility:

In preparation for the 2019–20 school year, principals and their designee/s should identify students in grades 2 and 6, who will no longer be eligible for busing if promoted to the next grade; these students will be eligible for **full-fare MetroCards only.** To support affected families with this change, school officials should communicate student transportation eligibility changes by June 20th.

Backpack Home NYC Schools Account Creation Code Letters

As the end of the school year approaches schools should support parents who wish to create a NYC Schools Account in order to view their child's attendance, report-card grades, progress towards graduation, NYC FITNESSGRAM results, and assessment scores. Beginning in September, NYC Schools Account will also display student transportation information, including transportation eligibility, MetroCard type (if eligible), transportation bus schedule by day and time, and school session-time information. Encourage families who have not yet created an NYC Schools Account to do so.

Distribute High School Appeal Decision Letters and View Offers

Distribute Appeal Decision Letters (middle schools): Next week, high school appeal decision letters will be available in MySchools for all eligible students who submitted an appeal. Families who submitted an appeal will be emailed to inform them that they can log in to MySchools to view their child's appeal decision letter.

Review Middle School Appeals Round Offer Letters in MySchools

On **June 11**, the DOE released letters in MySchools for all students who participated in the appeals round of middle school admissions.

School officials and or their designees should encourage families to visit their local <u>Family Welcome Center</u> with questions regarding their child's middle school placement, or if they would like to consider other options for next school year. Family Welcome Centers are open Monday through Friday all summer.

Guidance on Travel Safety for Students and Families This Summer

The DOE in partnership with the NYC Department of Health and Mental Hygiene (DOHMH) would like to share tips with families who plan to travel outside the U.S. this summer. Consulting with a healthcare provider and following preventive recommendations, such as making sure routine vaccinations are up-to-

date, are the best ways for students and their families to avoid illness and enjoy their vacation. Given the measles outbreaks around the world, it is important for families to check that they are immune before a trip.

Free Summer Meals Program

The annual **Summer Meals** program providing free, healthy breakfasts and lunches at public schools, pools, parks, libraries and other locations around the city will launch on **June 27**. Free summer meals are available to all children 18 years and younger, regardless of New York City residency. No ID, registration, or documentation is required. (Please see attached flyer)

• The Learning Technology Grant

The NYS Education Department (NYSED) has awarded District 30 a Learning Technology Grant for the next three years. The grant will provide 25 content teachers each year with intensive, professional development focusing on integrating **FlippedTIPS**' exemplary technologies into the curricula or Science, Math, ELA and Social Studies.

By adopting this Professional Development model into the school's curricula, the teachers will demonstrate problems based learning by guiding their students in the identification, analysis and solving of a curriculum or community social problem. Teachers will have the opportunity to develop an original, interdisciplinary, online inquiry-oriented activity for their students and develop a web-based presentation.

A link on the District 30 website will include an overview of the program as well as program materials and resources.

Five schools are mentioned in the grant but not limited to:

30Q76. 30Q 171, 30Q111, St. Francis of Assisi and St. Joseph Academy.

This grant opportunity is available for all teachers that would like to attend up to 25 teachers per year. Teachers participating in the grant will receive the use of an iPad to use to implement the project into their classroom. The equipment is for the use of implementation and not personal use. The school is responsible for the safety of the equipment.
